

The Laws of Supply and Demand – Tough Choices

My final year in seminary I had, what I thought, a tough choice to make: I could keep my car and drop out of school until I earned enough to continue, or I could sell my car and use the proceeds to pay my tuition -- I learned a lot riding the bus that year.

I learned the bus route by heart after a few failed attempts waiting in the cold for my connector back to seminary. I learned that where I went and what I could do were not only dictated by my finances, but also access to transportation. I learned to love riding a bicycle again (even when



it was freezing) and I learned the hidden places where the homeless found respite.

I also learned a great deal about grace from friends who would loan me their car from time to time so I could take my dog, Bob, to the vet, or strangers willing to "tell me where to go" when I wasn't sure how to find my way home. Whether by choice or circumstance, when you are poor the options available to you are limited.



One of our community members recently had heart surgery to repair a congenital birth defect. Of course, she didn't have insurance. How can you afford health insurance when that decision will affect your ability to provide shelter for your family?

Her story is not uncommon in our community. Everyday farmworking families make hard, difficult choices. Our hope is that with the opening of our Health & Wellness campus, the choice for better spiritual and physical care will become a little easier. It is our way of showing grace to those in our community whose choices are limited.

The first phase is the dental clinic, operated entirely through dental professionals willing to give up one day a month to help those in our community whose choices are few. These are dedicated volunteers. Most adults in our community have never seen a dentist. By the time they reach the clinic neglect and disease may make extraction their only choice, which is why dental education will also be part of every patient's visit.

In preparation for the opening of our clinic, Mission Smiles brought their mobile dental clinic to the mission for a Saturday brigade. It was a great opportunity for our volunteers who had undergone the required training by the Florida Department of Health, and our volunteer dental professionals to get a firsthand glimpse of what we would be doing on a regular basis.



The professionals saw 43 patients and performed 46 procedures. In that one day, over \$15,000 in free dental care was provided in our community. In addition, each patient received spiritual care, a dental hygiene kit, and had their blood pressure checked.

I learned a lot my last year in seminary riding the bus, I have learned even more since coming to Beth-El. In all ways, this is a ministry of grace. If you would like to learn more about the clinic or how you can volunteer, please email me at <u>Kathy@beth-el.org</u>.
