Seasons

The advent of the Plant City Strawberry Festival normally marks the end of the main growing season here in Florida. Soon strawberries will make way for the brief blueberry season. There will still be peppers, tomatoes and melons to pick, but before long many of our families will begin their journey to other fields.

For those here on a work visa, it will mean a journey back to their homes in Chiapas, Mexico and the bittersweet reunion with families and loved ones. For others, it is the beginning of the long trek north to the fields of the Carolinas, Ohio, and Michigan. Hopefully, it has been a good season where the harvest has been bountiful and their wages fair.



We experience the change of seasons at Beth-El in a number of ways. For our young, it is the hopeful anticipation of a week at CedarKirk or the fellowship of Vacation Bible School. Two of our older youth will be graduating from High School this year. They will face new challenges as they balance their hopes and dreams with the reality of their need to help support home and family. For many young people, their choices are few, and the only pathway available might be to follow their parents back into the fields and another generation in poverty.

Several years ago, Beth-El launched an initiative called "Step Up for Success". The goal of the program is to provide the tools and resources to those interested in improving their economic well-being through a one on one mentorship program. Many of the participants in this program have advanced thanks to college scholarships provided by Beth-El and other partnering organizations. Yet, we have found that for many students, the greatest need is just a matter of getting back to the basics of reading comprehension, creating a budget, or preparing for a job interview.

Recently, students from the dental assisting program at Hillsborough Community College volunteered at the Beth-El Dental Clinic. This experience offered the students a "hands-on" opportunity to work beside dental professionals in their chosen field. The experience was made possible thanks in part to several of our professional volunteers who reached out to the school's program educator, providing the bridge between Beth-El and HCC.

The mission would like to expand additional opportunities for vocational training, but the key ingredient is building the one on one relationship between student and mentor. You, as our partners in mission, are a key ingredient to the success of this program. We need more mentors to work with our students. We also need organizations and schools willing to support our students with opportunities for "hands-on" experience. Finally, we need your continued financial support to make these opportunities available.



For the last several days the words to an old Diana Ross song have been floating around in my head. It was the theme to the motion picture, "Mahogany" in which a young Diana Ross works her way out of poverty underscored by the theme, "do you know where you're going to?" Those

words seem so relevant especially during this season as many of our young prepare for the next chapter of their life. Do they know the bountiful possibilities life can hold if just given the opportunity? There is so much all of us at Beth-El hope and dream for our children, but it is not a journey we can accomplish without your help.



Leaders Now

Greetings from Nuevo Camino at Beth-El! Youth fellowship is a priority here. We are in regular contact with 20 youth.

A recent Bible study and information session about camp at Cedarkirk focused on baptism and how we are all members of the body of Christ, the Church. (1 Cor. 12). Discussion and study highlighted how each member is of value and there is a place in the community of faith for each to serve. I talked with youth

about how we often hear "youth are the future"-- but I reminded them there are many ways to serve now. Each youth is a leader now—serving to support the Sunday worship service through the music ministry or worship leadership, actively participating in Sunday school, volunteering at the food pantry or the dental clinic during weekends or school breaks, serving as shepherds during the weeks of Summer VBS programing and more. Many of our youth serve in adult roles in the world helping parents to fill out important



paperwork, serving as translators in both formal and informal contexts and caring for younger siblings while parents work.

At Nuevo Camino we need our youth now! A small group of adult leaders work with me to remove barriers to participation in youth fellowship by: sharing the value of our programming with parents, encouraging youth to participate, providing transportation to church and other activities as many families don't have transportation or parents are working. We gather for Bible study, fellowship, fun and service.

This year we have no budget due to financial challenges. We plan to hold fundraisers, including garage sales to support our youth and church programming. Our main goal is to raise funds to attend a Christian music concert (Mercy Me) in May and to hold a special May dinner to celebrate the end of the school year and 2 youth graduating from high school! Please hold this valuable ministry and our youth in your prayers. If you have items to bring in for our garage sale or other donations, please contact me . We hope to hold the first sale in April!
